We want to get to some of the other people 8 9 who are on the agenda that are here. 10 AUDIENCE MEMBER: Can you repeat 11 that now? Sorry, now, what? Can you 12 repeat that whole discussion? 13 MR. FLOWER: We're going to ---14 we're going to close the public hearing 15 effective right now and we're going to 16 adjourn it and we're going to reopen it 17 later, later in the meeting so we can get some of our other business out of 18 19 the way tonight. 20 MR. DERESH: So tonight we're 21 going to have it? 22 MR. FLOWER: Then we're going to 23 reopen the public hearing on the Sikh 24 Temple. 25 MS. VISCONTI: Correct.

10	MS. BETTINA: 8 o'clock?
11	MR. ROBERTS: Just say second

24	MS. BETTINA: Good evening.
25	MR. CAPPELLI: Good evening.

2	MS. VISCONTI: Good evening.
3	MR. CAPPELLI: We're here this
4	evening to continue the adjourned public
5	hearing that we had back in December.
6	Since that time we've made some headway
7	with the central water and sewer
8	situation at the site with the town
9	board and with the town's professionals.
10	We have made an attempt to
11	finalize some of those engineering
12	issues and planning issues that Bob and
13	Dave had. We tried to address in a memo
14	that we recently sent to the board
15	answering most, if not all, of the
16	questions that were asked at the last
17	public hearing.
18	We have with us this evening, as
19	requested by the board, Mike Nowicki,
20	who is he's our habitat wetlands
21	consultant, to answer any direct
22	questions of the board, any the public
23	may have.
24	MS. COLE: Excuse me, can you
25	just speak up a little bit, because we
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1	Proceedings
2	can't hear you back here.
3	MR. FLOWER: Can you speak up?
4	MR. CAPPELLI: And pretty much
5	that's it.
6	MR. FLOWER: Okay. Before we go
7	any further, just I did forget to
8	mention earlier, anybody in the
9	audience, there's a copy of the
10	questions from the last meeting with
11	answers. If anybody didn't get a copy
12	of it it's on the podium in the back,
13	you can have it to review.
14	I think that we'll probably ask
15	Mr. Nowicki to just describe some of the
16	issues regarding the site, but after
17	that we will again open the floor to
18	public comment, but we'd like to hold
19	the public comment only to new comments.
20	If the question's been already, you
21	know, posed and answered on that sheet,
22	then we just really don't wouldn't
23	like to have it repeated again, but
24	anything that needs to be addressed is
25	addressed to the board, not to anybody
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1	Proceedings
2	in particular involved with the project.
3	Focus the questions to us, we
4	will take down all the information and
5	then the information will be distributed
б	to everyone at a later date. At this
7	point in time if you want to
8	MR. NOWICKI: Hi, Mike Nowicki,
9	biologist for the project. I completed
10	the threatened and endangered species,
11	including the Blanding's turtle habitat
12	assessment for the project and the
13	delineation of the pond at the top of
14	the site.
15	Just briefly, for Blanding's
16	turtles, which I think is my purpose for
17	being here, New York State threatened
18	species utilizes a complex of habitats
19	for its lifecycle, kettle holes, shrub
20	ponds, forests and wetlands, upland
21	hardwood forests and open meadows
22	typically for nesting.
23	According to the DEC the biggest
24	impediment to Blanding's or the biggest
25	reason for Blanding's turtle mortality

is roadkill. They don't make it across
roads very well, being a reptile,
especially well traveled roads such as
All Angels and Old Hopewell Road. This
site being in the location that it's in
it would be extremely difficult for an
adult turtle to reach the habitat
complexes across All Angels Road that
may provide habitat for it with the
water across the road and traveling the
open meadow for potential nesting.
There are some habitats off the
site on that side of the road that
should be considered core habitats and a
core habitat is essentially a shrub
filled pond, three to four foot water

19Females need open areas for20nesting. The site is open but, again,21difficult, if not impossible, for a22turtle to reach. If a turtle could get23across the road and could nest on that24site the nest wouldn't be viable. They25are a species that --- they

depth, that's generally what they need.

2	thermoregulate with the heat, with the
3	sunlight of the day. Having no cover on
4	that site whatsoever, no nest would be
5	no nest would any eggs that
6	would ever hatch on that site,
7	hatchlings would never make it offsite,
8	would never make it to a wetland habitat
9	so that they could be viable.
10	Again, according to the DEC the
11	roads are the biggest threat to this
12	species and this site is essentially
13	isolated from any other contiguous
14	habitat by the road network and the
15	homes surrounding it. So if it was on
16	the other side of the road or in a
17	different location there would be
18	potential. In its current location or
19	in its location you're not going to have
20	any success and the habitat is not going
21	to be viable for them. That's it.
22	MR. FLOWER: All right. Thank
23	you. Okay. Let's open the floor for
24	public comment. When you step up to the
25	podium please give your name and
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Proceedings 1 2 address. MR. DERESH: May I speak against 3 4 the wall so I can be heard in the back? 5 MR. FLOWER: What's the difference? 6 7 MR. DERESH: I mean, I want them to be able to hear, as well, because 8 9 this addresses something that these guys 10 have created. 11 MR. FLOWER: It's more in 12 addressing --- well, if you can speak 13 loud enough I imagine they'd be able to hear you in the back. If you want to 14 15 speak at the side, that's fine. 16 MR. DERESH: That's fine, no 17 problem. I'll speak louder. 18 MR. FLOWER: Actually, speak 19 clearly, like I said, to the 20 stenographer and give her all your information. 21 22 MR. DERESH: My name is Richard 23 Deresh. I live at 37 Carrol Drive. 24 MR. FLOWER: All right. 25 MR. DERESH: Good evening, Mr.

2	Chair and committee board members and
3	concerned Wappingers Falls citizens.
4	We're here today to listen, learn and
5	provide facts and to voice our opinions,
6	as we did at the last meeting, regarding
7	the proposed site and possible
8	construction of Sikh Temple at the
9	corner of Old Hopewell Road and All
10	Angels Hill Road.
11	Many residents of the community
12	were unaware of the events that were
13	underway until some of our concerned
14	citizens explained to them in detail
15	what we learned at the last public
16	hearing. What I bring tonight are some
17	questions that are straight out of the
18	comprehensive plan that was adopted by
19	the board and the committee back in
20	2010. I cannot quote the entire plan in
21	the amount of time I need but I can ask
22	a few questions and comments about
23	others.
24	In 2004 a town survey shows that
25	environmental issues are important to

1	Proceedings
2	town residents. 96 percent of
3	respondents rate the preservation of the
4	environmental resources as important or
5	very important. This was the highest
6	ranked issue facing Wappingers.
7	Ecosystems, clean ground water recharge
8	are just the beginning of the disruption
9	that will be created with construction,
10	building parking lots and other
11	non-natural material and chemicals that
12	will be used on this property to satisfy
13	and maintain. Are these environmental
14	issues no longer important to our
15	residents? I don't believe that to be
16	true. 96 percent believed it then, I
17	believe they still do.
18	Scenic beauty was one of the top
19	three reasons why people chose to live
20	in Wappingers. Is this still true? I
21	certainly believe that. Per the
22	Department of Environmental Conservation
23	in 2016 and 79 percent of Wappingers
24	Falls residents quoted back in 2010
25	under the comprehensive plan support the
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1	Proceedings	
2	valuable open space resource as the town	
3	continues to grow, especially in	
4	developing areas where they may be the	
5	only green space remaining due to	
6	aggressive building projects.	
7	I believe this land could serve a	
8	better purpose than being built upon and	
9	creating environmental difficulties to	
10	start with. Relatively new permeable	
11	soil is covering much of the town, often	
12	resulting in less water percolating into	
13	the ground. Again, this comes out of	
14	the comprehensive plan.	
15	There has been a great deal of	
16	scientific attention given to pollution	
17	and decomposition on roadways and	
18	parking lots from automobiles. Sources	
19	including cariogenic compounds, heavy	
20	metal, broken down rubber polycarbides	
21	as a result of tire wear, lubricating	
22	oils, etc., the active methods on the	
23	site also, to mention a few.	
24	The detention pond and	
25	bioretention pond areas shown on your	
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1	Proceedings	
2	preliminary drawings will take the water	
3	containing these chemicals and	
4	collectively drain it slowly into the	
5	ground. Or is this treated first and by	
б	what methods? Are all storm drains	
7	going to the bioretention ponds, if	
8	there are any, or how is this design to	
9	be environmentally effective? How many	
10	ponds are on the property, bio and non,	
11	and where are these located?	
12	This water will eventually reach	
13	the ground water supply and potentially	
14	work its way to the wetland habitat	
15	across the road where most of the area's	
16	water excess already collects when the	
17	heavy rains fall. What issue will this	
18	bring physically and chemically and	
19	possibly to the Blanding's in that	
20	habitat? The comprehensive plan was	
21	quoted in 2010 under environmental	
22	resources saying this reduces water	
23	quality and I agree. Is this not still	
24	true? Has there been an updated or	
25	revised comprehensive plan?	
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1	Proceedings
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	I have spoke to numerous State
3	and Federal officials regarding this
4	project and nowhere has it been brought
5	to their attention the request for
6	information regarding these endangered
7	species before this property has been
8	decimated in 2010. Unfortunately, we
9	don't know how much damage has been done
10	because no one has reviewed this parcel
11	before this work commenced. The subject
12	of endangered or threatened species on
13	this property has never been a factor
14	when indeed this area of Wappingers
15	gives habitat to some of them and
16	looking back in Hudsonia's report in
17	2009 it showed that.
18	This project needs to stop. Most
19	people enjoy a nice return on their
20	investments. The return my fellow
21	neighbors and my family would like to
22	see is the property used for other
23	options and not to be destroyed by more
24	selfish construction.
25	Many issues have been brought up

1	Proceedings
2	on this project regarding pollution,
3	whether it be by noise, water, soil,
4	light and visual. Water runoff,
5	wildlife population constantly at risk
6	for habitat loss or even the decline of
7	pollinating insects due to the clear
8	cutting, grading and insecticides
9	applied to the properties. Each one of
10	these are as important to some as the
11	other.
12	To quote a great song, paving
13	paradise, whether large or small, does
14	not validate or attract the families
15	that Wappingers comprehensive plan was
16	trying to achieve in 2010. Preserving
17	and protecting what valuable scenic land
18	that Wappingers suburbs has left does.
19	That's all I got.
20	MR. FLOWER: All right. Thank
21	you.
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23	(APPLAUSE)
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25	MR. FLOWER: All right. Anybody

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MS. COLE: My name is Arlene Cole, spelled C-O-L-E, and I live at 4 Scott Drive in Rockingham Farms. I moved up to Dutchess County in 1972 because I wanted to live in the country. Specifically I moved into Rockingham Farms in July of 1982 because it was a nice, quiet family oriented development. Having this gigantic building at

12 this intersection of All Angels and Old 13 Hopewell, which is known for their car accidents already, is going to be 14 15 monstrosity. Okay. I quickly went 16 through the minutes of the last meeting 17 and I'd like to just recite my comments based on what was recorded in those 18 19 minutes.

About the habitat, okay, the tree frogs is one thing that I'm very worried about. Used to be three years ago you could drive through that intersection and the din from the tree frogs was so loud you had to close your car windows

2	to hear yourself think. Now you barely
3	hear a peep since all the construction
4	has happened there. The area across the
5	road that all the water is going to be
6	directed to, okay, I personally stopped
7	traffic and picked up turtles and put
8	them into that habitat which they were
9	trying to get to over the years. So I
10	know there are turtles there.
11	Let me see. There are also tree
12	frogs, red winged blackbirds,
13	hummingbird moths, which are very rare
14	to find, black snakes, milk snakes,
15	rabbit, deer. I've seen all these
16	creatures there over the years, so I
17	know they're there, I'm not making
18	anything up here.
19	Okay. I'm concerned about the
20	native plants that are going to be
21	bulldozed under, which the birds, the
22	bees and butterflies depend upon. I'm
23	talking about milkweed, goldenrod, Queen
24	Anne's Lace, Columbine, acai, Fox Glove
25	and many, many other native wildflowers

2	which will not grow in, you know,
3	regular yards and stuff, because I've
4	tried it, okay. These plants and
5	flowers will only grow in wild areas and
б	we're killing them off and then everyone
7	says, oh, what's happening to all the
8	honeybees. Well, duh, look around you.
9	Okay. One of the things that
10	really bothers me is that eight four
11	bedroom homes constructed on the site
12	where the temple is supposed to go is
13	being used as an example of, you know,
14	footprints. Eight houses at
15	3,200 square foot footprints, I defy
16	anybody to show me a house in Rockingham
17	that's 3,200 square feet. Most of the
18	houses there are maybe 1,100 to about
19	1,500 square feet. Okay. So all of
20	this stuff in here is garbage. Okay.
21	The driveway that they put in here is
22	probably twice the size of any driveway
23	we have in Rockingham Farms, so all of
24	that information should be stricken from
25	the record because it just does not
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1	Proceedings
2	apply.
3	Okay. Oh, one question I have,
4	is there going to be a call to prayer
5	siren in this, you know, installed in
6	this temple?
7	MR. FLOWER: I don't know. We'll
8	have to have that addressed, we will
9	review that.
10	MS. COLE: Could I have an answer
11	now? I mean, surely you must know now.
12	MR. FLOWER: As stated in the
13	beginning of the meeting, we're
14	collecting information. We'll have the
15	applicant, you know, provide answers to
16	the written questions.
17	MS. COLE: Okay. Because that
18	will not be tolerated, we won't allow
19	that. Okay. The other thing is that it
20	says here the dome is not considered to
21	be part of the building. Well, it's not
22	floating in midair. It's attached to
23	the building so it's part of the
24	building. It's like saying my front
25	porch isn't part of my house. Okay.
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1	Proceedings
2	This dome is part of the building and
3	for anybody to say it's not is just
4	splitting hairs and it's disingenuous.
5	What I want to see, I won't use
6	the word demand, I'll just use what I
7	strongly suggest that the town do is
8	that they make this organization build a
9	cardboard replica of the temple so that
10	the community can see what the visual
11	impact of this building is going to be,
12	as well as the impact of the wind coming
13	around the building, you know, where the
14	lights are going to be and all that kind
15	of stuff.
16	I think we have the right to
17	expect this because I have been living
18	in this development for 35 years and a
19	lot of people have been living there a
20	lot longer than I. All right. I think
21	that we have the first call as to what
22	happens in our neighborhood. Okay.
23	This is not the place for this building,
24	whether it be a Sikh I'm sorry, I
25	didn't say that right Sikh temple,
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1	Proceedings
2	I'm sorry, a Sikh temple, a catholic
3	church, a Walmart or anything else. No
4	building of this size should be
5	constructed on that property, okay,
6	because it's going to kill our property
7	values and it's going to cause a lot
8	more problems than what it's worth and I
9	think oh, yeah, also, the I've
10	done this kind of funny.
11	The building, okay, is two to
12	three times the height of the
13	surrounding neighborhood, the buildings
14	in the surrounding neighborhood and
15	no, I'm sorry, I said that wrong. Yeah,
16	two to three times the height of the
17	buildings in the surrounding
18	neighborhood and 22 times larger in
19	square feet than any of the houses in
20	the surrounding neighborhood. So the
21	impact of that building on our
22	neighborhood is going to be catastrophic
23	and we just cannot allow it, okay,
24	regardless of who's putting it up for
25	whatever purpose.
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1	Proceedings
2	And the fact that the building is
3	going to be constructed over a period of
4	years, okay, doesn't sit well with me.
5	When I put the extension on my house I
6	had to get a permit, I had to tell the
7	town how long it's going to take to, you
8	know, do the extension. If I overran
9	that amount of time I would have to get
10	an extension on the permit. I was not
11	issued a CO until, you know, the whole
12	inside of the house was finished and I
13	think that this building should be held
14	to those standards as well.
15	Okay. And if the organization
16	wants to really be good neighbors, then
17	I think they should take it upon
18	themselves to notify every single
19	household sorry, I'm getting dry
20	mouth because of my medications in
21	Rockingham Farms about this development
22	and get their feedback. Okay. Because
23	that's what other business have to do.
24	MR. FLOWER: Yes, that's the
25	purpose of a public hearing, you know,
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1	Proceedings	
2	the neighbors (Interrupted)	
3	MS. COLE: Yes, but people don't	
4	know about the public hearing because	
5	people don't wade through pages and	
6	pages of notices to find something that	
7	big that might pertain to them. You	
8	know that as well as I, okay. I mean,	
9	let's be honest, okay.	
10	MR. FLOWER: Right, I understand.	
11	MS. COLE: So I'm just saying,	
12	you know, being a business owner in the	
13	past I always made it my business to go	
14	to the neighborhood where I was	
15	conducting business and making sure that	
16	I met every single person in the	
17	neighborhood and told them what I was	
18	about and everything else. That's what	
19	a good neighbor does. Thank you.	
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21	(APPLAUSE)	
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23	MR. FLOWER: Okay. You can come	
24	up.	
25	MS. DERESH: Hello, I'm Karen	

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1	Proceedings
2	Deresh at 37 Carrol Drive. And just to
3	add to what Miss Cole said, I did go
4	through the whole neighborhood, myself
5	and my neighbor, and we did put together
6	a petition and we have over a hundred
7	signatures on here from the whole
8	surrounding area. This should have some
9	validation that people do not want this
10	on the property. I'd like to hand this
11	in. I have copies if you'd like this,
12	this is a valid petition.
13	The next thing I would like to
14	say is back in 2007, I know this is
15	awhile ago, I have a letter here from
16	the Town of Wappingers and at this time
17	was Joseph Ruggiero was the
18	supervisor and I had spoke with him and
19	had written about the property at that
20	time to set up a community protection
21	fund and he did respond and the Town of
22	Red Hook protects their farms with this
23	community preservation fund and I would
24	like to give you this also for your
25	consideration. It's valid, they do it.

2	It's their farmlands are protected,	
3	bottom line. Why are we not doing that?	
4	I could read the letter, but	
5	MR. FLOWER: All right. I	
б	understand it's a letter, but it wasn't	
7	established.	
8	MS. DERESH: Right, but why can't	
9	we establish something like?	
10	MR. FLOWER: That would take the	
11	town board to establish that, that's not	
12	for this board to do.	
13	MS. DERESH: I also would like to	
14	get a copy of the report from	
15	December 24th that says that the	
16	report suggests no habitat exists. And	
17	I would also like to ask a question	
18	about with regards to the property	
19	being cleared. It was cleared for	
20	farming purpose, a submission was made	
21	to the town for farming use. When was	
22	that done? Because this land was	
23	cleared in 2010.	
24	MR. FLOWER: Okay. I or somebody	
25	will get back to you with that	

1 Proceedings 2 information. 3 MS. DERESH: Okay. And that's it. So who do I submit this to? 4 5 MR. FLOWER: Give it to the б secretary, she'll take it. Thank you. 7 MS. DERESH: (Handing) 8 9 (APPLAUSE) 10 11 MR. FLOWER: Gentleman with the 12 blue hat. MR. O'DONNELL: That's an easy 13 one. 6 Balfour Drive, William 14 O'Donnell. 15 16 MS. OGUNTI: I'm sorry, your 17 name? MR. O'DONNELL: William 18 19 O'Donnell. Why can't we fly a large 20 helium balloon at the 45-foot height just to show how high this building is 21 22 going to be? 23 MS. COLE: We have the right to 24 know. 25 MR. FLOWER: Yeah, we can do

2	that.
3	MR. O'DONNELL: I mean, that
4	would be pretty easy.
5	MR. FLOWER: That would show
6	that would be fine. We'll look into
7	getting that taken care of. Okay.
8	There's a woman here in the red jacket.
9	MS. PEDERSON-GROVER: Hi, Marion
10	Pederson Grover, 348 All Angels Road.
11	Our property is right next to where the
12	temple is going to be built and I had
13	four concerns last time, some of them
14	seemed to be addressed in this, but one,
15	I had asked specifically about the
16	driveway, how far away from our property
17	it was going to be, and at the last
18	meeting they said it was going to be
19	225 feet and in this it says 110 feet.
20	So I was wondering which one is correct?
21	Second thing was about water, the
22	retention ponds, are they going to be
23	stagnant, are mosquitos going to be able
24	to lay their eggs in it or is this
25	something that's going to be moving

2	moving water? Because one of those
3	ponds is right by our house.
4	MR. FLOWER: Okay.
5	MS. PEDERSON-GROVER: The
б	lighting was kind of addressed in this,
7	it seems that's not going to be that
8	much of a problem, but my last concern
9	is it says that until they get they
10	don't get a certificate of occupancy
11	until the exterior is all done. My
12	question is what about the vegetation
13	that was going to be put around? As of
14	right now there's none next to our house
15	and that's (Interrupted)
16	MR. FLOWER: You're referring to
17	the screening around the border of the
18	property?
19	MS. PEDERSON-GROVER: The
20	screening, but there's nothing in here
21	saying that the screening will be in
22	place before everything is given the
23	okay for them to go on.
24	MR. FLOWER: Well, the board has
25	the right to ask for that as part of the

2	project to be done and we will ask the
3	applicant to do it at an early stage.
4	MS. PEDERSON-GROVER: Okay. It's
5	just being a good neighbor. And the
6	thing about the mosquitos, is that
7	something that could be answered, too,
8	the pond, the collecting ponds?
9	MR. FLOWER: Yeah, we'll have
10	that addressed, the water scenario.
11	We'll have the applicant address that
12	issue.
13	MS. PEDERSON-GROVER: Okay.
14	Thank you.
15	MR. FLOWER: Yes, sir.
16	MR. FONTANA: Good evening.
17	Michael Fontana, 41 Carrol Drive. First
18	I do want to apologize for the last
19	meeting, a little angry, was just, you
20	know, not prepared. I do apologize.
21	MR. FLOWER: All right.
22	MR. FONTANA: I understand they
23	did a study on traffic; how was it done
24	and when was it done?
25	MR. FLOWER: It was done in part
•

2	with the Dutchess County Department of
3	Transportation.
4	MR. FONTANA: How was that done,
5	the study?
6	MR. FLOWER: We can get you a
7	copy of it if you would like.
8	MR. FONTANA: Yeah, I would like
9	that. Just another question. You know,
10	the only reason I'm asking is because
11	sometimes they use Carrol Drive as a
12	drivethrough if there is backup at the
13	traffic light of All Angels and a lot of
14	the people that drive through just cut
15	through. You know, wherever you look on
16	Carrol Drive there's children, a lot of
17	children, and people, they have no
18	respect for the stop signs and they
19	speed.
20	If this plan does come into
21	effect will the town put up speed bumps
22	or something just to slow down the
23	people that are cutting through?
